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Objective

Highlights

- The recommendation is to release data on the department's Use of Force on an annual basis.
- This report should present the public with detailed information on the trends identified in Use of Force for that year.
- PERF has made the recommendation to improve transparency and accountability within the department.

Current Policy

- Currently, the Use of Force statistics are only provided upon public records request.
- The Proficiency Skills Unit does tally Use of Force statistics;
 - for internal use
 - to voluntarily submit to the FBI National Use-Of-Force Data Collection initiative.



Gap Analysis

- Recommendation
 - Annually release a Use of Force Report to the public.
- Current Policy
 - The collection of Use of Force data is for internal use, but shared upon a public records request.



PERF Guiding Principles on Use of Force (2016)

To build understanding and trust, agencies should issue regular reports to the public on use of force.

- Agencies should publish regular reports on officers' use of force, including:
 - Officer involved shootings
 - Deployment of less-lethal options
 - Use of canines
- Reports should include demographics information about the officer and subjects involved in use-of-force incidents and circumstances under which they occurred
- These reports should be published annually at a minimum and be widely available on agency's website and hard copy.





Not all departments release Use of Force Data, but the many who are, are releasing the Use of Force data publicly via a variety of methods. Here are some examples:

Pros

- Reviewing Annual Use of Force reports, it illustrates:
 - How infrequently Departments use force in proportion to the number of calls responded to.
 - When force is used, it's usually minimal.
 - This is all in stark contrast to what the public sees on the news, and they should be able to see these facts.
- It supports transparency, accountability and builds community trust.
- We are already collecting this data and it would be relatively simple to report online.
- There is a current appetite for this information by the public.



Cons

- Statistics are only as good as what's reported. Caution should be had to provide meaningful data.
- If no context is included with data, an inaccurate narrative could be heard.
- The media sometimes appears to use certain data and leave out other data to support their own conclusions.
- Best practices are still being established for what kind of data to collect and through a standardized collection system. Caution should be had during implementation. Other police departments have been challenged to provide complete, accurate, timely and useful data.
- Who is going to write this report? Some reports are 100 pages long. Some
 Departments release data then suddenly stop. We need to do it in a way that
 is sustainable.
- People viewing the statistics may not be trained in Use of Force and could misinterpret data based on lack of experience.



Proposed Action

Release Use of Force data annually to the public but do so in a meaningful but sustainable manner.





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
